Greetings from the President of the IHPA

Dear Honey Producers,

It was my fault that the September newsletter was so late. I apologize for that. The Iowa State Fair causes such turmoil in everyday life for all of us involved. To get everything that needed to be included in the BUZZ just took extra time and the deadline for the issue was during the fair.

I had decided that maybe I had done enough for this organization as your president. I had made getting another state apiarist one of my goals. That goal has been met with State Apiarist, Andy Joseph. Now appeared to be the perfect time to step down. I have since realized that we have another huge problem that needs to be addressed. That thorn in our side, as an organization, is the chemical spraying and the detrimental effect it has on all insects. To work on the situation, a group of entomologists, ISU extension personnel, the pesticide bureau, aerial sprayers. Andy and myself met to discuss possible solutions. There are so many conflicting studies about the proper time to spray, how the labeling law is being misused for the chemicals being applied, the application process itself and what protection the apiary registration is actually doing for us. We met to discuss all of the above plus more. I will report on the outcome in next month's issue. This is now my goal as your president. We need some protection from chemical spraying and other entities have agreed. We are working to better the situation. If you have any ideas or suggestions about this subject, please let me know. My address and email address are listed on the back of this issue. We need your input. (Ivan, I am sorry, I misspelled your last name. I must have missed it when I proof-read organization. the copy.)

Notice to Members of the IHPA

The officers and board members of the IHPA would like to propose some changes to our by-laws. This is being published so that members having questions or suggestions could present them to us before the annual meeting so that the amendments can be finalized for voting during the business meeting section during the convention.

Article III-Membership, Section 2-The Annual membership dues in the Association shall entitle the holder to membership from the beginning of one annual business meeting until the beginning of the next annual business meeting. Proposed change: THE ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP DUES IN THE ASSOCIATION SHALL ENTITLE THE HOLDER TO MEMBERSHIP FROM JANUARY 1 UNTIL DECEMBER 31 OF THE CURRENT YEAR.

Article IV-Officers and Directors, Section 1- The officers of this Association shall be a president, a vice-president, secretary, treasurer and historian. There will also be seven directors, one of which will be the immediate past president. All officers will hold office for one year and be elected at large from the State of Iowa. Proposed addition: EACH OFFICER OR DIRECTOR SHALL BE OVER THE AGE OF 21.

Article VI-Duties of Officers, Section 3-The secretary and the treasurer shall keep the records of the Association, handle all funds and carry on all business of the Association. Their activities shall be under the directions of the Executive Board. They shall close their books prior to each annual meeting and make a report at the annual meeting. The books shall be audited annually. Proposed change: THEY SHALL CLOSE THEIR BOOKS ON DECEMBER 31 WITH THE AN-NUAL AUDIT TO BE PUBLISHED IN THE ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER. A REPORT WILL BE GIVEN AT THE ANNUAL MEETING CONCERNING ASSOCIATION FINANCES.

Featured Beekeeper of the Month

Our featured beekeeper of the month is Marlyn Duncan. He and his wife, Kathryn, are from Vinton, Iowa. Their business name is "D's Busy B's".

Marlyn became interested in bees in 1967 while he was working in Central City, because Mr. Gibb Sellers had bees in his back yard. Marlyn started with 2 hives. Two years later he had 10 and at one time he had 60 hives. Now he has 50 colonies. He produces comb honey and extracted honey to sell.

Marlyn enjoys just watching his bees during spring build-up through the summer, supering and

the final extracting of honey. In the future, he plans to continue his current number of colonies.



Marlyn is a member of the East Central Iowa Beekeepers, a group that meets four times a year. He likes to attend the meetings and share information about what is going on in his area. He says the weather this spring has been a big factor in beekeeping in this area too. The group presents programs to schools, children's library summer programs and other interested groups. Marlyn says he also enjoys reading the "Buzz" and the information it contains.

Marlyn writes about the flood and says, "During the flood in June 2008, 12 hives of my bees had to be moved. I spent 3 ½ hours moving them. When I checked on a Tuesday evening, I raised the hives up 1 foot. The water was not around the hives yet. The next morning, Wednesday, the water had risen 2 ½ ft. and the water was 1 foot deep around the hives. I waded and moved them to higher ground. Each hive had to be broken down and carried by hand. Lots of stings. All hives were saved. These hives are located 2 ½ miles from the Cedar River 500 year flood. Because of the flooding of the area the bees don't have a good nectar source so there will be just a very small honey crop from these hives."

Thanks for your story Marlyn and sorry to hear about your bad luck with the flood.



THE BEEYARD REPORT

It has been a summer that paralleled 1993. There was a lot of rain and great bloom but no heat. Potential was unrealized. The thought of potential reminded me of my dad. He didn't think potential was worth anything. He always told me you couldn't take it to the bank. He didn't think much of potential in individuals either. His feeling was that you either did it or you didn't. It wasn't always the people with the most ability who got things done. We didn't agree on much but he was right on that one.

The mite drop indicated that we had to get the supers off some of our vards early and get mite treatments in. Adam pulled the first one on August 10th. Half of our treatments were in by Sept 10. The bees look good but they can disappear in a couple of weeks if there are too many mites. I have been back through some of the yards two weeks after treatment. Most of them look really good---even the colonies that were dropping over 100 mites/ day. The first yard we pulled has several colonies that crashed. They were pretty much toast

before we pulled the supers.

As we approach the latter part of Sept, we are finally getting some nice weather. The bees are working goldenrod and the other yellow flowers. I still have ragweed blooming my yard. It's covered with bumble bees, honeybees and a multitude of other insects. The Spanish needles are on the verge and the little white asters are starting to show. There is quite a bit of smartweed also. I don't know how long it has been since I mowed the yard at home but I'm thinking several weeks. Things look a little ragged. The horses haven't done a very neat job of keeping things trimmed up.

We have 32 barrels extracted. The crop estimate looks slightly better than it did last month--about 45 barrels or 55#/ colony. We did get a record quantity of

comb honey but if you add it to the average, we only gain about 4#/colony. We have over 30 cut comb boxes that the bees never touched. Adam brought a few finished boxes home in mid Sept. Amazingly, they still had white caps. I would have expected them to be vel-

Our queen yard has evolved into 39 full sized colonies. We gave them a second deep underneath this year so we can force them down with syrup.

Last year we left them as singles. The bees clustered in the middle of the frames. There was food all around them but they can only access what is on top.

Quick and Easy Honey Peanut Butter Popcorn Balls

Makes 6 (three inch) popcorn balls 1/2 cup honey 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup peanut butter (any type)

6 cups freshly popped corn (regular or hot air popped- about 1/4 cup un-popped kernels)

Cooking spray

Optional: 1 tablespoons sunflower seeds or 1/4 cup raisins

Heat honey and salt in a small sauce pan. Whisk in peanut butter. Mixture should be smooth. Bring to a boil - uncovered. Boil 1

> minute. Immediately pour mixture over popped corn (and sunflower seeds or raisins). Toss to coat. (A rubber scraper works well.)

Lightly mist your hands with cooking spray and, while mixture is still warm, form popcorn mixture into balls. Pack balls well so popcorn sticks together but not so much that you crush the kernels.

Put popcorn balls on a dish or rack to cool completely - at least an

hour. Wrap balls individually in plastic wrap or store in a plastic container. I like to keep them in the refrigerator but storing them at room temperature is OK.

Cook's tip: We used natural (unsweetened) peanut butter to test this recipe but any peanut butter will yield good results. Just be sure the peanut butter is thick.

Some brands of natural peanut butter are soft and runny at room temperature which will prevent the popcorn balls from holding their shape. If this happens, keeping them in the refrigerator will help them stay firm.

Another cook's tip: After you've popped the corn, pick through it very carefully to remove any un-popped or partially popped kernels and discard them. You don't want your little goblins breaking their teeth.

We had a 98% death loss in that group.

There is a downside to having a number of colonies close to home. They try to invade our building when extracting starts and the wet boxes accumulate. We had 10# or 12# of bees hanging inside the warehouse. Alex came in the middle of the night and moved the boxes out. There are still a few bees that persist in hanging around but they aren't a problem.

We are approaching the anniversary of the tornado that hit our place last fall. We are still in the recovery mode. I can't imagine what it must be like in Parkersburg.

October Tips for the Beekeeping Year

Are your bees ready for winter? You might want to consider the following:

- Apply either **terramycin powder** or patties as an American Foul Brood preventative.
- Wrap your hives with the hive wrap of your choice. Remember that the honey bees need to be able to exit the hive during warmer weather for cleansing flights, don't wrap them too tight, leave an escape. Note: Honey bees keep the hive around 90 degrees winter and summer, wrapping them too tightly might result in suffocation.
- Ensure that they have enough reserves for winter. Feed the bees as needed.
- Place a small stick or pebble (about 1/16" thick) under the inner cover to vent the hive. Moisture is one of the major problems for a hive during winter months.
- If you haven't installed your entrance reducers, do so now. They help keep rodents out of the hive.
- If you are not wrapping your hives, move the colonies to their protected winter location, usually facing south.
- Register for the Annual meeting. Many helpful tips can be obtained by attending the Annual Meeting of the Iowa
 Honey Producers Association on November 7th and 8th in Marshalltown at the Best Western Regency Inn. Fellowship results in many different options for keeping honey bees.
- Bring your award-winning photos, your outstanding honey foods and any mead or wine that you make to the Annual
 meeting for the contests between members. It is great fun to see the photos, taste the scrumptious food and to sip the
 different meads that our members offer.
- Consider becoming a mentor for the IHPA youth scholarship beekeeping program. Contact Mike Brahms, (712) 774-5878 or mbrahms@netins.net volunteer. 




