entrance reducer, two hive bodies with frames and foundation, two medium supers with frames and foundation, telescoping cover with inner cover, division board feeder, hive tool, smoker with shield, bee brush, hooded jacket/veil, a pair of leather gloves, appropriate nails for construction of hive bodies, free beginner bee keeping classes, one year IHPA membership which includes "The Buzz" publication, and a mentor for a year! Upon successful completion of the year, as evaluated by the mentors and the Youth Scholarship Coordinator, students are awarded permanent ownership of their equipment. The past two years we have asked for scholarship equipment and bee donations. The support and encouragement of our donors helps to make this

# IHPA Officer & Director News

## Ramblings from the Russian Bee Guy President, Jason Foley

Hello and welcome to another addition of my ramblings! Today is December 4th and holy cow it is Christmas time already!!!! Well, since this is for the January edition you'll be thinking, "no, that was a week ago." For me it feels like the year has just flown by.

So our last semi headed out the evening of Saturday, Nov. 26th. I was amazed at how much warmer it was for that truck than our first one. The first semi was loaded in the snow and this one it was probably 50 degrees lol. Mother Nature has been pretty confusing this year. Last month you got to read about my issues with almost losing a wheel off my loader and Andy Joseph turning his jeans into chaps when he tried to jump off a stack. This last semi was not without incident. I mean for everyone else it was fantastic. No one ripped their pants, or got stung up, or had their vehicle catch on fire... But for me, I yet again had some issues. There's like this really strange curse that follows me around. Partly because I do some of the dumbest things that are not OSHA approved, and the rest is bad luck. But I never really get hurt physically. I've been hit by a car and thrown into a ditch with only a small bruise, road a crotch rocket at high speeds off a highway curve in a rainstorm without a scratch, fallen off roofs and out of trees, and a slew of other things but yet I stand here with not 1 single broken bone. My wife is still sure I'll be dead far sooner than her, but I've had my palm read and my life line says I'll live to 150 lol. So back to the last semi, Tyler Holton and I were working opposite sides of the truck with our perspective machines and we got probably 80% of it loaded without incident. Then my loader seemed to just be losing control power. She was still running fine, but the old 610 just didn't seem to want to turn or move correctly. I had a stack of 3 pallets up in the air and suddenly I just couldn't move in any direction more than a few inches. The voltage warning light would pop on every time I tried to push the controls and it reminded me of 2 years prior when the variable speed sheave was bleeding hydraulic fluid onto the drive belt. There I was, climbing over my chair and the engine with my cell phone light, trying to look down to where the belt was. Sure enough the belt was coated in hydraulic fluid and it was being flung all over the engine compartment. I'm probably losing some of you with technical stuff, but essentially this belt drives the machine through simple tension on the rollers. So when you coat it

with slippery oil (hydraulic fluid) the belt just slides every time you try to make the machine do a little bit of work. So I had to bail on Tyler and leave the rest of the truck for him. I limped the poor girl back to her trailer and she didn't even have the power to drive up the ramps. Tyler had to come over at the end of the night and push me up the ramps so I could haul the 610 bobcat home.

This last week I got the parts kit in and rebuilt the seals in the sheave. 4 small rubber washers that Bobcat charges \$50 for! Probably \$3 in rubber washers if I could find the perfect size at Menards Iol. Thanks Bobcat company for charging me 1,600 percent the value of an item. Wish I earned that much on honey! There wasn't any noticeable damage to the old washers, just seemed like one of them had been flattened down and allowed a small amount of fluid to slip by. Anyway, she is back to running normal now.

My next story will probably be written in California as I will be headed out there the beginning of January to start "waking the hives up" with pollen and syrup. My Russian girls are super frugal bees. Just because the days are getting longer doesn't trigger them to brood up like other bees. They brood up when food is on them. i.e. they wait for food to be in the environment before they start expending their bodily resources and energy for brood. Well if I want to improve my colony population prior to them going into almonds, I need to trick them into thinking spring is here a good 25 to 30 days prior. You know, because it takes 21 days for worker brood to be produced and hatching. It does me no good to be out there the week prior, like most beekeepers do; because they don't have the time then to improve the adult population count.

# Updates from your Event Coordinator

Happy New Year! I can't believe that 2023 is here already. For the event committee, 2023 means a very exciting year for our IHPA events. Check out the announcement for the 2023 IHPA Field Day in this issue.

Thank you for all the Fall Conference evaluations! You didn't disappoint me when I said I wanted your thoughts and comments on the evaluations. They were wonderful! I have addressed some of the comments below:

#### Food/Snacks

\* Gateway controlled ALL the costs for food, drinks, and snacks for the entire conference. The only reason that we got to serve the small birthday cupcakes and the lemonade is because it was our 110th birthday and the lemonade was one of our products at the Iowa State Fair. All the meals were chosen from the Gateway menus. Each luncheon and dinner had a 7% state sales tax and a 24% service charge added to each meal, which made the costs of each high.

\* The cost for a gallon of coffee was \$45.00. A 7% and 24% charges would also be added to the cost of coffee. These costs would make a single cup of coffee very costly.

#### **Zoom Presentations/Presenters**

- \* Each zoom presenter was contacted 24 hours prior to the conference to confirm the date and time of their presentation. Each agreed to the day and time. The only problem that occurred with a zoom meeting was that one presenter double booked two presentations on the same day and at the same time. The presenter has apologized to IHPA for his mistake.
- \* Members enjoyed the different age groups of the presenters and the different topics. The breakout sessions were "good to excellent".

#### Location

\* The rating for the location of the conference was mostly "excellent". Members liked the idea of having the conference in the middle of the State. You also liked the idea of having lodging attached to the center.

#### **New items**

# Recipes by Emma Ingram

My name is Emma Ingram, and I own Highness's Honey in Indianola, Iowa. Every month I write the cooking column based on recipes from the IHPA cookbook. I love writing these articles and trying out new recipes, but what I love even more is hearing from you all what recipes you have tried or what recipes you want me to try next! Have you ever seen a recipe in the cookbook that sounds good, but you aren't sure if you want to put the work into something not so yummy? Let me know and I will try it out! Happy January! What a crazy season it has been! Christmas was full of fun family time, great food, a few new honey recipes to try, holiday markets, and the start of a quieter time for the bees. Every year, the first week of January feels like a good time to make plans for the new year, enjoy a little rest, and refresh old equipment. This year I decided to try out a few honey vegetable recipes to start the year and remind me of summer. I tried sweet potato cobbler and fried honey corn. The first recipe was a little more time consuming than some with the pastry and skinning the potatoes, but it was well worth the work. The second reminded me so much of summer and fresh sweet corn I will have to make it again in a few months.

#### Honey Sweet Potato Cobbler: (Pg. 144)

2-3 pound sweet potatoes, peeled and slices 1/4-inch thick 3 1/2 cups water (Enough to cover sweet potatoes) 1/2 cup honey

1 teaspoon ground nutmeg

## Pastry:

2 cups flour2/3 cup shortening2 tablespoons melted butterWhipped cream (optional)

11/3 cup sugar 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 teaspoon salt 3/4 cup butter, cubed

1/2 teaspoon salt5-6 tablespoons cold water4 teaspoons sugar

Boil sweet potatoes in water until crisp-tender about 10 minutes. Drain but reserve 1 1/2 cups cooking liquid. Layer potatoes in a greased 9"x13"x2" baking dish. Drizzle with honey. Add reserved liquid. Combine sugar, flour, cinnamon, nutmeg, and salt; sprinkle over potatoes. Dot with butter cubes.

For pastry: Combine flour and salt; cut in shortening until coarse crumb texture. Add cold water until mixture forms a ball. On a floured surface, roll pastry into 9"x13" rectangle. Place over filling; cut slits in top. Brush on top melted butter and sprinkle with sugar.

Bake at 400 degrees for 30-35 minutes until top is golden brown. Spoon into dishes and top with whipped cream, if desired.

Emma's Notes: I really enjoyed making this recipe, but it did take a little while. The pastry crust was very forgiving, which is nice since I have never been good at making flaky pastries. I did not have to get the consistency perfect for it to still be tasty and soft. I rolled out the crust to 1/4 inch thickness and had extra pastry to cut off so that it fit in the pan (I made a honey butter glaze then coated and toasted the extra pastry). For the sweet potato part, it took much longer than 10 minutes for the sweet potatoes to become crisp - tender (for anyone confused by this phrase, the potatoes should still hold their shape well, but you should also be able to easily insert a fork). My potatoes took almost 30 minutes to reach the desired softness, so plan accordingly when you make it! The sweet potatoes combined with the honey and sugar was very sweet so I plan to reduce the sugar in the future, but overall, the cobbler was delicious! It would make a great side to meatloaf or a "healthy" dessert for all those January diets!

#### Fried Corn: (Pg. 132)

4 Tablespoons butter or oleo 1/4 cup honey Fresh Corn (Cut from the cob)

Melt oleo or butter in skillet. Place corn in skillet and stir. Pour honey over corn and continue frying until honey and butter combine to make syrup. Season with salt and pepper before serving.

<u>Emma's Notes:</u> This recipe is so simple to make! Although fresh corn is ideal, frozen cut corn works too for the winter months. You will just need to make sure you thaw and drain the corn before frying. The combination of sweet and savory was amazing. In the future I will add a little bit of chili powder and paprika for just a little more savory kick. Overall, we will certainly be making this recipe come summer sweet corn season, but it is a great "taste of summer" for a long January day!





# From the Beeyard

Tis the season for truck trouble. We loaded bees at the Pella holding yard. The truck got there late so it was after dark before the boys were done loading. The yard has a gravel lane going into it that is not much wider than the truck. When the driver tried to drive out in the dark, his wheels got off the gravel. He was instantly stuck. We needed to get gravel under the wheels but the loader bucket was in Lynnville. Alex came up to get it. It was around 9:00 PM when he pulled in. He loaded the bucket and went back to Pella. They got the truck out the next morning (Saturday). Things happen in the dark. Most of them are bad. While Alex was getting the truck on the road, I was "The Grinch" at the local library program.

It is now the following Monday. Alex pulls in with our "new" flatbed. It is a 2001. It had a very large oil leak at the rear of the engine. I worked on trucks for over 30 years but I am at the point in life where I don't want to do it anymore. What's more, I don't have time for it. I took the truck directly to Lynnville Repair. I think there is an oil sending unit at the back of the engine. I am hoping that's all it is.

All of this started when the clutch went out of our 1999 flatbed. I thought the problem was hydraulic since the clutch worked at startup but then faded after a few miles. We tried the hydraulic kit and things worked fine for a little while. Then the hydraulic line blew off of the slave cylinder. At this point we put in a new clutch. That worked until we got the truck home. Then the hydraulic line blew off the slave cylinder again. After another hydraulic kit, we are back on the road—at least temporarily. When ihe truck was backing into the driveway I heard the clunk of a loose u-joint. I crawled under the truck. Sure enough, there

were two loose u-joints. They were really loose and ready to eat into the yoke. I thought to myself, "I can do this." Then I noticed some fool had welded the u-joint caps to the yoke. I cannot imagine any reason for doing that. We had to get the driveline rebuilt. It was \$1000. Ouch!!

We have a new California spot. We used to be up in northern California near Corning. Now, we are in the Turlock area. Adam got hooked up with these people when he went to the AHPA Meeting in Tucson. It remains to be seen how well it is going to work out. We have shipped two loads (as of Dec 12). We have tentative plans to ship a third load later this week. I don't know if we will have enough bees for a 4th. We are still getting a count.

Winter tasks are underway. We have 100 cut comb supers to get cleaned and put wax put in. There are a number of wax orders that we need to process wax for. There are several boxes of frame parts that have been setting around for years. We are trying to find the parts that are compatible. I am sure you have noticed that frames are getting expensive. We are trying to salvage what we can. It is all part of figuring out how much equipment we are going to need come spring. We also have yard rent to get out. I like to have that done before Christmas. Some of the landowners like to give honey to their friends. As they say---"No rest for the wicked."

The holidays will be past when you read this but so will the equinox. To my mind, that means it is downhill to spring.




