Sprinkle chicken generously with salt. Let stand about 30 minutes while coals heat up.

In saucepan cook butter and garlic for 5 minutes over low heat, stirring frequently. Stir in mustard, vinegar, honey and Tabasco sauce.

Cook over low heat. Baste on chicken last 10 to 15 minutes of cooking time.

Dear Honey Producers,

I hope everyone has had a successful time installing packages, splitting colonies, re-queening hives or obtaining nucs for the busy summer season. Remember as you place colonies in their designated yards to register their location. If you need help, contact Andy Joseph, the Iowa State Apiarist at (515) 326-5765. The numbers of registered colonies, producers and bees are up this year. You may register locations at any time if you need to relocate hives. The locations being updated will be included in the registry site for chemical applicators. As they access the site, they will notice the additional listings and will have them for reference when applying insecticides. We can only accomplish great things for the beekeeping industry when we all work together to improve situations. This is a BUZZ issue. step forward for all beekeepers.

Consider talking to the local chemical applicators in your area to work with them this summer. The more communication between applicators and beekeepers, the better the situation is going to turn out. Just have a friendly conversation, answer any questions about bees or beekeeping and remember not all people know the issues facing beekeepers or even the facts about how honey bees collect nectar and pollen. Try some old fashioned conversation and go with an open mind. Express an interest in working together. knows, maybe something good will come out of the situation.

NOTE: We need a substantial supply of comb honey in plastic boxes and section comb honey. This item is usually in short supply and thus bidding doesn't make sense. We will accept cut comb in plastic boxes and wooden and round section comb containers. Quality standards for all comb honey are: clean cappings and all cells capped. Cut comb in plastic boxes must be well drained with little or no liquid honey. We will pay \$4.00 per unit for cut comb in plastic boxes or section comb honey which weighs at least 14 ounces. We will pay \$3.25 for comb honey in round containers that meet quality standards. Honey from all suppliers must be 2000 crop, Iowa honey with 18.5% of less moisture content and excellent overall quality. All of the containers need to be at a uniform fill line and free from foam. The IHPA booth manager has the right to refuse any containers not meeting this standard. Winning bids will be based on price, quality and ability to provide required quantity of product for the entire fair. All winning bids will remain in effect for the duration of the Iowa State Fair. Bids must be received by June 30, 2009. Please sign the bid sheet and provide address and phone numbers. Suppliers of State Fair Honey will use their own business label on products supplied for State Fair Sales. Labels must be attractive with preprinted wording, which includes name and address of the supplier and net weight of item supplied. Include one sample of your label with the bid sheet. The IHPA booth manager may limit the number of flavored creamed honey for sale due to lack of adequate sales space. NOTE: Arrangements need to be made to pick up any unused product between 9 p.m. & 10 p.m. Sunday, August 23 or 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. Monday, August 24, 2009.

Beekeeper of the Month

We had bees in the backyard from the time I was born in 1980, so beekeeping has been a lifelong association. During our time in Fairfield, we only had a couple of bee yards, and we sold all of the honey out of the house. I took the bees for granted at that age—I think that using the smoker and cranking the four-frame extractor were the main highlights for me. I never would have guessed that I would one day defend a Ph.D. on the history of beekeeping.

I got more serious about the bees in 1994. We had moved to Lynnville several years earlier, and we kept bees in a few more locations than we had in the past. My dad asked if I wanted to take responsibility for one yard that year. I think there were about twenty hives back in that pasture. It didn't matter that I was not old enough to drive since it was just a quarter mile behind the house. I decided it sounded like an interesting experience and agreed to do it for a fifty percent share on the honey. The honey was a little slow filling the boxes that year, but I eventually had a crop and looked forward to the next honey season. Next year I was driving around to all the bees—still a year short of my license but too interested in the bees to worry about getting pulled over.

Everything exploded after that. soon had hundreds of colonies and Dad started delivering honey to more stores.

When the honey house went up in extremes of summer heat and humidity 1996, bottling moved out of the basement and extracting moved out of the garage. My younger brother Anthony became bottler and extractor extraordinaire in short order.

The most memorable challenge popped up in 1999. I came home from my first vear at Iowa State and discovered a widespread outbreak of American foul-We brood. I had read enough on bee diseases to suspect the symptoms of gooey larvae and hard scales. One of the in-

> spectors confirmed our situation. We had to melt a lot of combs and use a regular regimen of terramycin, but I got it cleaned up just in time for the honey flow. That episode still haunts me. Still, it has been a lot of fun for the most part. I long ago started to appreciate the in Iowa. Anything that helps the bees puts me in a better mood. Keeping a larger number of hives means a lot of work. We have over six hundred colonies this year, but it's very satisfying to reflect on how we've transformed a longtime hobby into a more substantial family business. My brothers Anthony and Eric have gone on to other pursuits in recent years, but three of us are still here trying to keep the bees alive and make some honey. Between Phil, Alex, and myself, hopefully we can keep things rolling as more honey seasons approach. If you want to keep track of our adventures, I periodically share our excitement at
