

# **Greetings from the President**

Hello Beekeepers,

I am writing this on March 14<sup>th</sup>, the weather has been good, 50's to mid 60's with a slight chance for spotty showers. We set the clocks ahead last weekend so the sun doesn't set till near 7:30 pm. No excuses for bees to die from late winter starvation. Hopefully if you suffered some winter losses you have taken the time to analyze the reasons for the losses. I'd like to concentrate on the live ones. "Nutrition", that's the Buzz word in the Beekeeping community lately. With a good warm normal spring the bees can usually hold their own, I believe sugar syrup and a protein supplement will still benefit and give you a better chance for success. If we have a normal or hopefully warm and dry spring many will have the challenge of trying to keep their hives from swarming. I have heard from some beekeepers that their hives came through the winter well and look strong and healthy, others that say many hives survived but are fairly weak and they won't be able to split many of them and still others that lost most or all of their hives. I guess that is pretty much normal in beekeeping these days. I have heard from some experienced beekeepers that have weaker hives and many dead outs, so it is not only the beginners having problems. On the flip side I have talked to some beginners and also long time beekeepers who have come through the winter very well with the hives loaded with bees. Obviously, it's much more enjoyable to have and hear about the strong live colonies.

For those of you that are just starting out in beekeeping and also the more experienced beekeepers, don't get too discouraged if you have lost hives because beekeeping is a very hard profession or hobby to be successful at.

So many variables, moisture, wind, predators, mites, viruses, brood diseases, pesticides, fungicides, herbicides, and beekeeper manipulation all being factors that can be different from one area to the next.

Beekeeping can still be a very enjoy-

It is just a lot easier to do it that way. Our death loss is fairly heavy so we might need a few pkgs anyway. I was hoping to hold death loss in the 30% range but I'm afraid it is going to get close to 40%. On the upside, the colonies that are alive look very good.


