Legislative News

Lobbyist: Jamie Beyer

The Legislative Session will start the week of January 10th. Our team is in place to monitor and to introduce positive legislation for Honey Bees. Our team consists of our paid professional lobbyist company, the Capital Group, myself, Doyle Kincy and HR Cook. HR, Doyle and I are volunteer who provide the factual information about bees to legislators. One piece of legislation that we will attempt to get passed and signed by the Governor is to designate the Honey Bee as the State Insect. This piece of Legislation just about passed two years ago but then Covid hit and really threw a wrench into the process. To make a long story short -- we will have to start the process over again this year. Please contact any of us to give us your input on legislation. In next month's Buzz I will be updating you on legislation that has and will be introduced.

We are also in place to monitor and be able to react quickly to any legislation that is harmful to our hobby/profession. Unfortunately, this is one of the most important reasons we are there.

The planning of Iowa's Honey Bee Day is progressing. Remember it is Wednesday March 30 from 7 AM to 9 AM. Yeah, it is early, but this is time Legislators have to talk to us. After that time of the day, they are either in committee meetings or are in session. Please refer to the Press Release that we are publishing again in this month's Buzz. This is my last chance to get the information about the day to you via the Buzz so I cannot emphasize the impact that this reception has on Legislators and their decisions about Honey Bees.

Our Queen, Allison Hager, is planning on being there as well as club queens from across the state. We are also inviting our Youth Scholarship students and parents to this day. What an opportunity it is for them to learn the Legislative process. We will be providing a tour of the Capitol that day after the reception. This tour is not only for the students but for anyone that wants to see the Capitol. As a side note the floor of the Rotunda where we are having our reception is the honeycomb design. It will be explained why this was incorporated into the floor.

Everyone is invited to this event. We want to connect beekeepers to Legislators and talk bees. It is interesting how popular the subject of honey bees is at the statehouse.

Finally, we are asking the Governor to sign a Proclamation designating March 30th as Iowa Honey Bee Day for 2022. We are doing this along with asking cities and counties across the state to do the same. A draft of what we are asking the Governor to sign is in this Buzz. Please assist us in the process and ask your city and county to sign their own Proclamation. We can electronically send you this draft in a digital format so that it is easy to forward to your city council and board of supervisors. Please contact me for it.

Two years ago, we had over 40 cities and counties sign their Proclamations. We think we can surpass this number this year. It raises awareness of the importance of Honey Bees. Almost all of the communities want to sign this type of positive news.

We have the tools to influence our Legislators -- we just need to use them. Hope to see everyone there on March 30th. Contact me if you have any questions, want to help or just want to comment. Thanks for being a member of IHPA and being part of a great community of beeks.

Press Release for Iowa Honey Bee Day at the Iowa State Capital on Wednesday, March 30th

The Iowa Honey Producers Association is hosting a Legislative Reception/Breakfast on Iowa Honey Bee Day. It will be in the Rotunda of the Iowa Capital Building on Wednesday March 30th. It will be from 7AM to 9AM and all interested elected officials, honey bee keepers and citizens are invited.

We are going to be asking Governor Kim Reynolds to sign a Proclamation designating March 30th as lowa Honey Bee Day along with many City Mayors and County Supervisors across the state. In the proclamations they will be stating that honey bee and native insects are important pollinators for a third of the food we eat. Honey bees face serious threats from invasive pests, decreasing bee friendly forage, variable climate and increasing pesticide and herbicide pressure.

IHPA expects beekeepers and concerned citizens from across the state to attend this reception and meet their Legislators.

We have established a great tradition of having a legislative breakfast on this special day. I believe this is the 4th year we have had it. We missed last year, of course. It is a great and fun way to meet legislators and other beekeepers that want to learn the legislative process. We do have an influence on legislation that favors honey bees. February has arrived and while our bees may be tucked snugly in their hives, we beekeepers get to do all of that off season maintenance and preparation for the coming spring. Why not take a break from all that hard work and plan a nice dinner in with your Honey to celebrate Valentine's Day! I tried out two delicious recipes for a fancy dinner at home with my own family and they certainly fit the bill! These delicious honey glazed sweet potatoes are beautiful in presentation and pair nicely with bacon wrapped pork tenderloins.

Honey Glazed Sweet Potatoes (Pg. 137)

11/2 pounds sweet potatoes or yams, peeled and quartered2/3 cup orange juice, divided1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg1 tablespoon butter

1/3 cup honey1/2 teaspoon ground ginger1 tablespoon cornstarch

Combine sweet potatoes and 1/3 cup orange juice in a 2-quart microwave-safe baking dish; sprinkle with ginger and nutmeg.Dot with butter. Cover and microwave at HIGH (100%) for 7-10 minutes or until sweet potatoes are tender, stirring halfway through cook time.Combine cornstarch, remaining 1/3 cup orange juice, and honey in a medium microwave-safe bowl. Microwave at HIGH for 2 minutes or until thickened, stirring every 30 seconds. Drain liquid from sweet potatoes; add that liquid to honey mixture. Microwave at HIGH 1 minute. Pour sauce over sweet potatoes and microwave on HIGH 1 more minute or until sweet potatoes are thoroughly heated. Makes 4 servings.

Emma's Notes: Very tasty! Overall, this recipe was very easy to make although it was a little more time consuming since you have to constantly be tending the microwave. Additionally, I was confused by draining the liquid off the sweet potatoes. That liquid is supposed to be drained into the other honey mixture and kept to use again for the glaze. Aside from that confusion, it was very fun to make. This recipe could also be baked for about 30 minutes and get similar results. You will want to make sure you cover it while baking and stir it about every 15 minutes. The potatoes should be tender but still hold their shape. If you want to make both of these recipes for a Valentine's Day treat, it works well to put the potatoes in the oven and toss the meat in about 15 minutes after that.

Bacon Wrapped Pork Tenderloin (Pg. 37)

8-10 slices of streaky bacon, long enough to wrap around the pork 11/2 times
1 pound pork tenderloin, at room temperature
Salt and Pepper
2 table

2 tablespoons honey (creates a glaze)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Lay the bacon next to each other on a cutting board, slightly overlapping. The width of the bacon should be enough to wrap the length of the pork. Season the pork with salt and pepper. Tuck the thin end under so the length of the pork is roughly the same thickness.

Heat the oil in and oven proof skillet over high heat. Sear the pork on all sides until nicely browned. Place the pork on the bacon.Use a knife to help keep the bacon together and roll the pork up, finish with the seam side down. Use the knife to transfer back into the skillet.Drizzle over with honey and brush all over. Roast for 25-30 minutes. Baste once or twice with the pan juice, mopping up plenty of the honey pooled at the base of the pork. Remove from oven and baste again. Let it rest for 5 minutes. Pork tenderloin is an extremely lean cut of meat so you really need to be careful not to overcook it. Baste one last time before serving. To serve, cut into thin slices.

<u>Emma's Notes</u>: Delicious! It was a super easy recipe to make but certainly looked like a fancy restaurant had made dinner. I also tried using tenderized pork loin slices instead of whole pork loin and that worked very well too. It decreases the cook time by 10 minutes which is useful if you are short on time and the tenderloin looks just as fancy. I also used the left over juice in the bottom of the pan as a sauce to put over the meat or potatoes (there wasn't much sauce left and the food didn't need extra sauce it was just so yummy!)

A Phenology Planner for Beekeepers

This last year, Julia McGuire received a SARE grant to write a book specifically geared to nectar flows for honey bees. The book will be released to the public in two parts. First to organizations and clubs, and second to individuals. She had requested that the IHPA review her book and let its membership know about it.

After reading the book I have a number of really good takeaways from it. I thought the information was pretty darn good. It's laid out in 12 months, with each month highlighting the bee important plants commonly found in Iowa. Even in the months that no bloom happens, it talks about how to identify trees and such. I also really liked that it gives you a blank page facing each of these monthly pages for the individual to jot down notes. This is handy if you have a unique situation that causes an earlier or later bloom, or an unusual nectar source you can note. It's also a great spot for you to jot down notes/reminders for bee practices you should be doing at that time of year (inspections, feeding, mite treatments, etc). The book sometimes pops a few suggestions out there for you, but this gives you a space to write all the other things you might be apt to forget about. Another fantastic thing is that it was paid for by a grant and is free to the public. How can you beat FREE?!?! Well, at least until the allocated grant funds run out. Nothing lasts forever.

The tiny bit of negative to the book is that much of the language is geared for a specialist. So if you are an entomologist or botanist, you'll feel right at home. Don't sweat it, it'll just take a little longer for a beginner to read through. They can still cherry-pick the good information out of it. My own personal opinion would have been to write it in more basic language. The majority of readers wanting info on nectar and pollen rich plants will be your novice beekeepers. Those that have been in it a while have usually researched it or been mentored, and just know what's happening at any given time of the season.

Ultimately it's a good resource for beekeepers and if you are unsure of your plants and seasons you should try to get your hands on a copy of it. For getting a copy you should prompt your local bee club to reach out to Julia, or contact her directly to get on her 2nd release henology Planner for list.

From the Beeyard

A collection of information from those with direct, personal knowledge about beekeeping

As soon as one thing ends, another begins. We finished getting our yard rent out the day before Christmas. It takes two barrels of honey. By the time we visit with the landowners and have coffee and cookies, there are two or three days invested in it. Alex does it now but when I did it, I found it enjoyable. On Jan 4, Adam and Alex left for California with Chris Jackson and Dave Korver to go thru the bees. The interlude was filled with prep for the trip west. They will spend around two weeks in California. It is always a relief when we get all the bees to California.

Our mite levels were in single digits going into September. I was optimistic. My optimism proved to be unfounded. As more of the brood emerged, a lot of mites emerged. Some of our counts jumped into the 20's. When October rolled around we probably picked up about 40% of the colonies on the Lynnville end. Adam fared better. His treatment regimen was slightly different. He used Extended Release Oxalic before we did. I went to the AHPA meeting in Baton Rouge. The consensus is that all of the treatments kind of work if it is warm enough. Even with constant monitoring you can't measure how many mites are in the brood. In my opinion, it can be up to 80% in the fall. If it is that high, the bees might as well have a death wish. Going to California makes this worse. If you winter in Iowa and get a long brood break, the timing of your mite cycle is going to be different. Still, you have to avoid that fall spike if you are going to keep your bees alive. This is a pest that has the potential to double its population every two weeks. It is getting harder to control them.

Chris Hiatt is now president of the AHPA. His goal is to keep losses under 35%. There are five Hiatt brothers. I think they run around 20,000 colonies between them. Years ago, when I first started keeping bees, the rule of thumb was that 1/3 of your colonies would be super, 1/3 would be average and 1/3 would be poor. That still holds to some degree but, now, the 1/3 that is poor is as going to be dead. Kelsey asked for tips for this month. My tip is to look at yourself as a mite killer first and a beekeeper second. There is a certain romance to beekeeping. There is no romance around Varroa mites. Long ago, when I was on the IHPA board, we produced a video that covered a year of beekeeping with Dick Blake. The picture quality was not so great but the content was good. It sold like crazy. I then had the idea to do one on controlling Varroa mites. I think we had a piece on foulbrood in there, also. I thought there was a lot of good information. If we sold more than ten of them it was not by much. It was like people wanted to ignore problems. You do that at your peril.

This is the time of year when we make our plan of the upcoming season. If we could just get the bees to run on the same plan, things would be much easier. We have to make some adjustments this year. We have been fortunate over the years to have been able to get good help. Last year was much more difficult on Adam's end. He had the body count but the people he had were largely incompetent. This resulted in some of the things he was trying to do to not work out very well. The labor prospects for this year are not very bright. We have talked about H2A but I would be surprised if that happened. This means we are going to have to do less of something. If there is anybody out there that would like to spend a summer with the bees, or a spring and/or fall for that matter, give us a call.

In closing, I would say get your equipment ready for spring. We always plan for a best case and worst case scenario. Usually, you will hit somewhere in the middle. Every once on a while, you will hit the best case. In 2005, we made 150#/colony. We were able to take advantage because we were ready. Even so, even with the best of planning, sometimes things just don't work out.

The days are getting longer, spring is just around the corner. Soon, there will be new life out there!!

This past year was a repeat of last year here at Spring Valley Honey Farms, the bees came out of the almond orchards in great shape, built up well and produced an excellent crop of low moisture honey. Mite counts were generally low, treatments were still applied, ample protein and syrup was fed, hives were full of bees and seemed to be thriving until October. Then the decline started and our numbers reduced by 50% by December. Hopefully the bees will still be looking good when we check them in mid-January. Hopefully the bees build up well on the Almond bloom and I'll be shaking packages from my own bees starting mid-April through mid-May. We will also be getting a load of package bees out of California from CF Koehnen and Sons in early April.

This is a paid ad. Do you want to talk about what happened at your event that already happened? This is likely an article, and is free to submit.
